## 5. Military Units: Army of Guatemala (Ejército de Guatemala)

### **Authorities:**

### Responsibilities:

The army's responsibility is to protect national borders, tackle transnational threats, improve critical infrastructure, co-operate in disaster relief missions, support Guatemala's foreign policy, and provide institutional support for organizations that deal with internal security. The Guatemalan armed forces also views it has constitutional authority to secure the territorial integrity of the country by combating illegal migration and narcotrafficking at the borders, as well as countering illicit flights in violations of sovereign airspace.

## Organizational Structure:

The Army of Guatemala and the Ministry of National Defense (MND) have an integrated command structure. The Guatemalan Navy and Air Force operate in direct support of the army. The MND also includes a Chief of the National Defense Staff. The Joint Staff (known as the EMDN) provides command-and-control (C2) for the Navy, Air Force, and territorial brigades.

The Army is composed of the Army High Command, Ministry of National Defense, National Defense General Staff, Military Commands, Special Military Commands, Military Services, Special Staffs, Personal Staffs, Military Education and Training Centers and Auxiliary Military Units.
